Ramser Arboretum

Location: 82°17′56.71″W 40°32′10.07″N State Route 3 north of Mount Vernon approximately 14 miles, turn right on SR 205, and proceed 200 feet to the parking lot on the left.

Habitat:

Ramser Arboretum contains 680 acres of mature woods, reforested old fields and wetlands in the hilly glaciated Allegheny Plateau of northwest Knox County.

Distinct features:


Ramser Arboretum's old fields have been planted with over 150,000 native hardwood trees. The Arboretum has over five miles of hiking trails. Watch for wild turkeys.

Birds to View:

Cedar waxwing, yellow-billed cuckoo, warblers (yellow, cerulean, prairie, black-throated green, black and white, yellow-breasted chat, common yellowthroat, hooded, Kentucky and blue-winged), vireos (red-eyed and white-eyed), rose-breasted grosbeak, scarlet tanager, rufous-sided towhee, blue-gray gnatcatcher, brown thrasher, barred owl, carolina wren, indigo bunting, northern oriole, wood thrush, American woodcock, great crested flycatcher, eastern wood-peewee and red-bellied woodpecker.



Knox Lake Wildlife Area

Location: 82°30′9.58″W 40°30′50.32″N State Route 95 north of Fredericktown. Take Old Mansfield Road and follow signage.

Habitat:

Emergent and scrub-shrub wetland habitat adjacent to a 478 acre lake with 11.4 miles of shoreline.

Distinct features:

Particularly in early spring, this area provides birding opportunities for diving and dabbling species of waterfowl. Watch for bald eagles year round.

Birds to View:

Ducks (ring-necked, lesser scaup, mallard, wood, blue-winged teal, bufflehead), gulls (Bonapartes, ring-billed), coot, Canada goose, great blue heron, belted kingfisher and redheaded woodpecker.

Wolf Run Regional Park

Location: 82°25′43.20″W 40°23′49.34″N U.S. 36 east of Mount Vernon, turn right (south) on Upper Gilchrist Road and left (east) to Yauger Road.

Habitat:

288 acres of rolling topography and contiguous open space featuring mature forest, a pond and grassland and shrub habitat.

Distinct features:

The 30 acre Knox Woods State Nature Preserve is located within the park. Take the Woodland Trail from the parking lot. Signs of the state endangered yellow-bellied sapsucker can be seen on downed logs on the right side of the trail near the bottom of the first hill.

Birds to View:

Blue jay, chickadees, tufted titmouse, white-breasted nuthatch, phoebe, eastern wood-peewee, warblers (yellow, yellow-rumped, common yellowthroat, blackburnian and ovenbird) woodpeckers (downy, hairy, red-bellied, pileated and yellow-bellied sapsucker), red-tailed hawk, red-eyed vireo, blue-gray gnatcatcher, indigo bunting, eastern bluebird, wood thrush, gray catbird, brown thrasher, northern mockingbird, Baltimore oriole, rose-breasted grosbeak and sparrows (field, song and chipping).

Brown Family Environmental Center (BFEC) & Kokosing Gap Trail

Location: 82°24′21.07″W 40°22′25.01″N State Route 229 east to the Village of Gambier, turn right (south) on Laymon Road, 0.5 miles.

Habitat:

Old field, grassland, prairie, pine plantation and riparian hardwoods near the Kokosing State Scenic River.

Distinct features:

Explore 380 acres of land which features a visitors center and several gardens. The paved Kokosing Gap Trail lies next to the site. Take the Gap Trail west during spring warbler migration.

Birds to View:

Over 165 species typical of woodlands, fields, wetland and riparian areas have been spotted at the BFEC. Of special interest are nesting species such as pileated woodpecker, white-eyed vireo, cerulean warbler, hooded warbler, yellow-breasted chat and eastern bluebird. A nesting pair of bald eagles is sometimes observed along the Kokosing River at the BFEC. Their nest occurs three miles downstream.
